
# Here is our newsletter to keep you up-to-date with all things DrugFAM.



### **Volunteers**

During the period we said thank you and goodbye to four volunteers: Charlotte Price, who facilitated one of our Support Groups, and Tammy McKenzie, Jack Cottam and Billy Wakeley, who took Helpline calls.

We also welcomed nine new volunteers: Kelly Wilson, Marianna Montes, Marie Ferry, Amy Thorburn, Beth Horsley, Cecily Mattock, Chloe Collingwood, Hetty Cane and Lauren Mann. We are delighted to welcome them to the DrugFAM team.

Currently we have 25 Helpline volunteers (with 7 in training) and 15 Support Group volunteers (with four waiting to be trained).

Family Support Worker, Louise Neary, is now delivering Helpline training with Gill. Four new affected client case studies are being prepared, two recorded bereaved client interviews are being replaced and one new role play ('How Not to Take a Call') has been introduced.

We are very grateful for the dedication and commitment of our volunteers and couldn't do what we do without them.

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# **Operations**

Our new online Helpline rota system, Three Rings, continues to work well, allowing volunteers and staff to indicate their availability for shifts that need filling. We had excellent coverage over the Christmas and New Year period, which can be a particularly difficult time.

In March we will be changing over from our current BT Helpline phone system to a new tried and tested system, used by many well-known charities and companies, called Call Handling. Thank you to Vodaphone for providing 25 free SIM cards, each with 40GB data a month for six months, plus unlimited calls and texts, which will ensure those without Wi-Fi can still take calls.

Once the new Helpline system is up and running, we'll be changing over from our current CRM to one that is more intuitive, easier to update and linked with the phone system.

# **Bereavement Support**

Last November we were delighted to welcome Joe Wright to the Bereavement Support Team one day a week.

On 8 October 2022 we held our 14th Annual National Bereavement Conference, for the first time both online and in person. Thank you to the staff, volunteers and excellent speakers involved in the day. The feedback from attendees was excellent and we have already started planning for this year's hybrid event to take place on Saturday 7 October at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Gerrards Cross.

On 4 December we held our Winter Quarterly Bereavement Group attended by 21 clients. Our next Quarterly Bereavement Meeting will be held Sunday 26 March. People who are bereaved through a drug or alcohol related death are often surprised by how severe and long lasting their grieving is. This can be disorientating, very painful and worrying. The first part of the session will therefore be a short presentation to explain all bereavements and to explain some of the characteristics of these bereavements, as well as practical ideas for coping with grieving. The second part of the session provides an opportunity to share or listen. in small groups, to others who are bereaved. # **Advocacy & Networking**

Gamble Aware On 7 December 2022 Paul attended the Gamble Aware 10th Annual Conference, the theme of which was

'Taking action to tackle gambling harms as a public health issue'. GambleAware is an independent, grant-making charity commissioning prevention and treatment services across England, Scotland and Wales in partnership with expert organisations and agencies, including the NHS. Speakers included Chris Whitty (Chief Medical Officer for England), Professor Henrietta Bowden-Jones OBE (National Clinical Advisor on Gambling Harms), Paul Scully MP (Minister for Gambling) and representatives of Gamban, Betknowmore and members of the Gambling Lived Experience Network.

On 12 December 2022 Elizabeth and Paul participated in a House of Commons Home Affairs Select Committee (HASC) stakeholder engagement event in order to help




shape their views as they progress on their drugs inquiry. We spoke with the Committee about the work we do, and also about changes we would like to see in in this area to improve outcomes for those struggling with a loved one's addiction. Amongst others, they met Dame Diana Johnson (www.dianajohnson.co.uk) Chair of the Home Affairs Select Committee, who was very interested in DrugFAM's work, as was Carolyn Harris, MP for Swansea.



In February 2023 Chris and Paul met with the Head of Services of West Midlands based charity 'No Excuse for Abuse - no is no' (www. noisno.org.uk) who will be signposting us to their clients struggling

with a loved one's harmful use of alcohol, drugs and gambling.

# **Partnerships**



In December 2022 Paul met with the Policy & Communications Officer at Alcohol Health Alliance to discuss DrugFAM becoming a member. The AHA is a coalition of more than 50 nongovernmental organisations which work together to promote

evidence-based policies to reduce the harm caused by alcohol.


In February, we supported a collective call for funding for children of alcohol dependent parents to be reinstated by signing a letter to the Chancellor from members of the Alcohol and Families Alliance.

# **National Lottery Grant**

Our recently awarded Reaching Communities grant of £183,147 for 'DrugFAM Expansion' will cover the three-year period from 1 Jan 2023 to 31 Dec 2025. It will enable us to recruit a Marketing



and Communications Manager as well as investing in more employee training, volunteer training, customer management software, monitoring, evaluation and collaborative work.


# **Fundraising for DrugFAM**


